




Figure 42 Dandenong POP-UP-PARK (ASPEC




Figure 43 Leafy running track, The Tan Track

WILLESDEN ROAD



SPORTS AND CONNECTION

- 1 The SUP should cross south at the existing rail crossing. By shifting the SUP to the south of the rail corridor there are opportunities to provide street tree canopy to Carinish Road.
- 2 Integrate landscape design along the south of Carinish Road to soften retaining wall structure.
- 3 Add a traffic calming element (not a pedestrian crossing) at Prince Charles Street to mark the beginning of the corridor.
- Provide a continuous shade canopy along the SUP towards the regional attractor precinct and introduce a diverse mix of landscaped areas.
- **5** Locate fitness stations along the SUP close to the rest stops.
- 6 Locate rest stops along the SUP for pedestrians and cyclists. Locating a rest stop near Meade Reserve will facilitate families moving from the car park to the Reserve crossing Haughton Road.
- 7 Relocate some car parking from east of the station precinct against the retaining wall as angled parking. This will become multi-use parking, providing community parking spaces on the weekend. Note that the existing on-street car spaces are to be retained.
- 8 Shift the SUP to the street side of the car park and away from the train line. Opportunities for landscaped areas are greater to the south of the car park.




REGIONAL ATTRACTOR

- 9 Urban Play: An area focused on youth activity. Activities including skate boarding, BMX and potentially provision for youth outreach services are key amenities for this location.
- 10 Intergenerational Play: An area focused on intergenerational play experiences. Activities including rock climbing and playground facilities for youth are important amenities to consider.
- 11 Flexible Festival Space: This area will be a urban space to suit gatherings, celebrations and events such as the Clayton Harvest and Music Festival and Clayton Farm and Community Market. Smaller more intimate spaces and kiosks should be considered to cater for social interactions.
- 12 Social Interaction: An area that will provide facilities and spaces for social interaction between groups and individuals. Exciting soft and hard landscaped areas, bold colours and materials and seating areas will draw people to this location.

STATION PRECINCT

- 13 Integrate commissioned local public art installations will make the forecourt a visually exciting and attractive destination. Art incorporating light and signage will stimulate the space during the evening. Art pieces could be attached to the rail infrastructure to avoid additional clutter.
- **14** The design of amenities and station kiosk need to be integrated into the overall aesthetic vision of the Station. The kiosk should be visible from Clayton Road to increase activation of the station amenities.
- 15 Bus and weather protection shelters will not be generic structures but integrated into the overall Station Precinct design. This will give the new Station Precinct a uniform and high-quality design aesthetic.
- **16** Connecting the Station Precinct to existing retail and commercial activity across Carinish Road is important to create a unified destination. Passive surveillance through the activation of both sides of Carinish Road will make is a safe place.
- 17 Provide a surface finish treatment and access to site services (power, water) to support the temporary activation of this IDO space.



GREEN CAR PARK

- 17 Explore alternative car park uses to make this space an interactive and multi-purpose area. The Clayton Farm and Community Market could be held here, as well as small sporting activities. Introduce green landscaping and connections to improve the user experience of the car park and SUP.
- 18 Swap some of the proposed car parking to the west of the Station Precinct to create smaller, less intrusive parking areas.

BIG BACKYARD

- 19 Community gardens similar to those found at CERES Community Environmental Park and Dandenong Pop-Up Park are highly desirable and an effective way to encourage community members to engage outdoors.
- 20 This area focuses a mix of community and social outdoor activities, including unstructured and nature play elements, play facilities, areas for Bocce and walking and running paths.
- 21 Amenities and seating areas are to be located near the playground
- 22 There is an opportunity to include a meadow landscape for a less structured feel.

COMMUNITY SPORTS FIELD

23 This area gives the community a place to engage in programmed sports and activities. Potential sports playing areas shown include mini soccer, netball and basketball. Provide supporting facilities such as spectator seating, drinking fountains and BBQ.
