net zero carbon by 2025

Council has committed to a number of actions and strategies to achieve net zero emissions by 2025 following a detailed report to its February 2020 meeting.

A further report for a whole of Council climate action plan will come before the September 2020 Council meeting.

Council will also work with the Monash community to provide assistance and information on how they can reduce their carbon footprint.

These actions are part of Council's long-term consideration of climate change and its focus on determining a strong and comprehensive response to this issue. It comes after a significant amount of work on GHG emission modelling and is in line with Council's Environmental Sustainability Strategy (2016-2026).

The modelling indicated that 2028 was the optimum time to target carbon neutrality, but Council has decided to be more ambitious and has adopted a target of 2025.

This will require funding for key projects over the next few years however these changes are expected, in the long term, to result in financial and environmental savings.

Key projects identified include:

- » Participating in the Local Government Power Purchase Agreement for up to 100% renewable energy for all electricity use
- Major roads street lighting changeover to LED lights
- Major infrastructure upgrades of high energy usage sites, including our aquatic centres, to reduce energy use
- Investment in solar panels at key sites
- Expanding the use of electric and hybrid vehicles in Council's fleet
- Investment in Carbon Offset sourced from local business
- Developing the use of recycled content materials in council projects
- A commitment to protecting and enhancing our green spaces and tree canopy
- » The purchase of carbon offsets, when required, from businesses located within the City of Monash, wherever possible.

Council's corporate emissions represent approximately 1% of local emissions so to reduce our carbon footprint, it is critical that residents make changes as well. See our website for tips to help you make a difference.

ANI a born leader

A belief in using your voice to stand up for others saw Anirudh (Ani) Prakash named the 2019 Sir John Monash Youth Leadership Award Winner.

Ani has been drawn to leadership opportunities from a young age, starting in primary school. He is



driven by a desire to stand up for what is right and give a voice to people who need it most.

Winning the award validated Ani's desire to represent others within the community, but he also felt it was a reflection of the people who encouraged him to get involved.

"I was not collecting the award just for myself but as an agent of the various people and community organisations that have pushed me to get more involved with my community," Ani said.

Ani is an integral member of the Monash Youth Committee and chairperson in 2019/20, and was a big part of the group's advocacy for a headspace service in Monash. After years of campaigning, the Federal Government announced in March 2019 that it would set up a Monash headspace.

Ani wants other young people to know that they have the power for change.

"If you are passionate about an issue and want to improve our community, get involved. We need more young people to get more active in their local communities and fight the bigger issues with a community-focused lens," he said.

High Commendations were awarded to Medhi Juma Khan, for his work in volunteering opportunities including refereeing soccer games for young players, and Lisa Ping, for her decade-long volunteer work, from Conservation Australia to Oxfam.

At the February Council meeting, Council committed to a number of actions in response to climate change. A substantial amount of work over a number of years has gone into determining the best way forward for Monash, to get our modelling right and to commit to strategies that will make a difference. Our view was always that it was not about just speaking

> words on climate change, but about investing in real actions and strategies that will reduce emissions. We also recognise the loss of vegetation in Monash

and commit to protecting and enhancing our green spaces and tree canopy. Our team at Monash have undertaken significant work to help us set ambitious targets that are also achievable and I want to acknowledge their outstanding work.

We welcome the State Government's announcement of a Container Deposit Scheme, something Council has been strongly advocating for over many years. The government also announced plans for households to get a new fourth bin for glass recycling. Disappointingly, increased landfill waste costs have also been announced. We are awaiting more information to understand the impact of these costs to Council. We will keep you informed when we know more.

CARING for your four legged friends

Monash's 5712 registered cats and 12,086 registered dogs are much loved members of the Monash community.

One way you can show you care about your pet is to register them, to make it easier to find them if they ever go missing.

All dogs and cats aged three months or older must be registered and microchipped as a legal requirement by 10 April 2020. It is the pet owner's responsibility to ensure their pet is safely contained at home and doesn't wander.

If your pet is registered and does go missing and is picked up by Council, we can contact you straight away and reunite you with your beloved pooch or feline if we have your registration details.

Registration costs \$48.90 for most dogs and \$41.60 for most cats that are desexed. There are discounts for pensioners.

Cats need to be desexed before they are registered for the first time but some exemptions apply. Compulsory cat desexing was introduced for newly registered cats in Monash in 2015 to reduce the number of cats being born.

FOOD WASTE RECYCLING is coming...

There's an exciting change happening for disposal of your household food waste in Monash. Starting July 2020, food scraps can go in your green waste bin that's currently used for grass and garden prunings. Things like fruit and vegetables, meat and fish, coffee grounds, eggs, bread and dairy, rice, pasta, cooked leftovers and paper towels can be recycled.

As part of this change, households with a green waste bin will receive a kitchen caddy and information booklet to help you collect your food scraps for recycling – these will be delivered to you in the coming months.

More than half the contents of Monash household garbage bins is food waste. When food is sent to landfill, it rots and produces greenhouse gas methane that contributes to harming the environment. Recycling food in your green waste bin will mean food waste is kept out of landfill and turned into high quality compost which will be used by local farmers to improve soil health and crop productivity.

We'll be here to support you through this change. We are developing education materials and will provide further information across social media, your Monash Bulletin and our website.

CAT CURFEW to start this year

A cat curfew to ensure cats are safely contained at night and protect local wildlife will start later this year.

With the introduction of the curfew, cat owners are not required to do anything complicated or expensive. They simply need to ensure their cats are safely contained at night, preferably in their house or garage.

Cats are great companions to many residents in Monash. There are currently 5712 registered cats in Monash.

However, they are also natural predators and if they are left to roam at night they can do enormous damage to native wildlife and be a nuisance to residents.

Animal welfare organisations and professional bodies like the RSPCA

and the Australian Veterinary Association recommend that cats should be kept indoors as much as possible for their safety and wellbeing as this reduces the risk from fights with other cats and animals, being injured by cars and contracting disease. Agriculture Victoria advises that cats who remain contained in your property can live up to three times longer than those who roam.

The cat curfew is one of a number of measures in Council's Domestic Animal Management (DAM) Plan.

MONASH COUNCIL ward boundaries under review

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is reviewing the ward boundaries of Monash Council and is seeking your input.

Ward boundaries are adjusted so that the number of voters represented by each councillor is within 10% of the local council average.

The review only considers adjustments to the location of ward boundaries. It will not consider the number of councillors or wards.

COUNCILLOR NEWS Cr Lynnette Saloumi

Council elections occur this October. When Councillors accept office they swear they'll undertake their role in the best interests of the people in the municipal district they represent and impartially carry out their duties to the best of their skills and judgement. I encourage constituents to consider Council candidacy or offer support to candidates who share their values. With Council currently dominated by males, I'd especially welcome increased representation from female residents. Although females make up 51% of our city's population, 82% of Monash's 11 councillors are male. The Gender Equality Act 2020 sadly doesn't include Councillors. I urge potential candidates to diarise 30 April's Local Women Leading Change workshop to be hosted by Monash Council in association with the Victorian Local Governance Association. It has been foreshadowed that training will be a prerequisite for eligibility to contest elections.

After previous attempts had failed to address the threat of climate change, at the 25 February Council Meeting, targets were set for Council activities and procurement that aim to reduce both GHG emissions and energy costs. Prioritising renewables makes financial sense. Consumers can reduce pollution and avoid escalating costs by switching to solar and driving hybrid or electric vehicles. I've discovered electricity bills have plummeted, and car registration is \$100 cheaper and fuel costs are miniscule. To reduce local car trips I've proposed a trial of electric bus shuttles in and around activity centres. Likewise it would be applauded if city planners could minimise built forms which radiate excessive heat, and instead integrate green public spaces within activity centres to combat adverse effects of overdevelopment. Liveability proponents and aspiring entrepreneurs, I suggest you tune in to ARC Laureate Fellow Professor Veena Sahajwalla online. She's a passionate speaker who'll inspire you to rethink recycling and the circular economy.

I'm pictured with Positive Aging Reference Group members who share wisdom and provide advocacy for 60,000+ seniors. I've re-joined the Disability and Multicultural Advisory Committees and debuted with the Gender Equity Advisory Committee.

As a former Waverley Little Athletics Centre committee member I'm looking forward to its AGM and presentation night, and congratulate its tireless supporter and President, Dylan Cooper.

With reference to my opening paragraph, I don't want to discourage male aspirants but I think from this October Monash deserves a more gender balanced Council. Ladies, there's plenty of songs to choose from for inspiration! From Helen Reddy's "I am Woman" to "Woman" recorded last year by Live at Warrawee's headline act, Clare Bowditch.

NEW CAMPAIGN to tackle Clayton waste

Residents in Clayton are being asked to 'Clean Up or Pay Up' as part of a new campaign.

The campaign is targeting areas in Clayton where there is a transient population due to Monash University and student accommodation.

The campaign follows complaints about rubbish from the Clayton community who are proud of their neighbourhood and want to see everyone doing their bit to keep it clean and tidy. Some of the issues identified include dumping of waste, unsightly properties and contaminated or overflowing bins.



For the last 12 months, Council has carried out bin inspections and door knocked residents to provide information and education on waste management.

However, the issues have continued. Council is now trialling a dedicated Litter Prevention Officer in Clayton and residents and property owners who ignore the education and warnings provided could face fines up to \$500.

Council will continue to educate residents and property owners to manage their waste but if no effort is made to fix concerns, residents will face fines.

We want residents to know that their waste is their responsibility.

The Clean Up or Pay Up campaign is currently being trialled in Clayton and may be rolled out across the municipality in future.
