We advocate

As one of our core values, advocacy is central to CASBE's focus. Membership to CASBE has grown by 20% over the past twelve months. This is both a direct measure of the success of our advocacy work and the primary strength behind it. Enabling, supporting and guiding councils through the successful Sustainable Design Assessment in the Planning Process (SDAPP) framework has been a draw-card for councils seeking environmental outcomes from their community. Similarly, a position

that is supported by 39% of Victorian councils becomes a powerful message to industry and state government stakeholders.

However our most important advocacy role is the daily contact established between member councils and the development industry. SDAPP and the local ESD Policies enable this interaction – these conversations between the ESD officers and the community about sustainable buildings are where outcomes are achieved.



With 31 members and an average of 19 councils represented at each Network meeting, CASBE is an active and engaged group, providing a leading example of successful collaborative governance. Our impact is demonstrated by the increase in the number of councils applying the SDAPP framework and those actively seeking an ESD Policy.

Over the past twelve months we have continued to deliver on the 2017–2020 CASBE Strategic Plan. We successfully delivered most of the 2018 Action Plan and are underway with the 2019 tasks.

CASBE starts the 2019–2020 financial year with an excess of funds, resulting from a period of efficient management and lower than expected costs associated with BESS. As a result of this we are increasing our staffing resourcing and research budget for twelve months to focus on our strategic work, specifically our strategic goal of *A Step Change in Impact*. An important aspect of this goal is to elevate environmental targets.

CASBE in detail



We collaborate

CASBE Network meetings are always well attended by both member and non-member councils. These meetings are open to all Victorian council staff working in the built environment.

Three working groups underpin and support the Network. The Referrals Working Group enables ESD Officers to share experiences and align practices. The Strategic Planning Working **Group** supported the round three ESD Policy councils (which were gazetted in October 2018) and is currently supporting the round four ESD Policy councils. The newly formed WSUD Working **Group** is helping to develop a common approach to the recent state stormwater planning requirements.

The BESS Governance Board and Working Group enjoyed a important increase in participation from member councils. On behalf of all CASBE members we would like to thank Moreland, Yarra, Port Phillip, Stonnington, Greater Dandenong and Darebin City Councils for their significant contribution to BESS over the past 12 months.

CASBE is partnering on two important collaborative local government research projects: SDAPP for Subdivisions, led by Wodonga City Council, and Loddon Campaspe Councils ESD Service Delivery led by Greater Bendigo City Council.



We take action

Our focus is the active development and implementation of innovative policy and ESD solutions.

In 2018 CASBE, in partnership with Moreland City Council, sought expert planning and legal advice to provide resources for statutory planners to support and enable the effective application of ESD Policy now held by seventeen local Victorian councils. The project a) reviewed recent VCAT cases and their potential impact on ESD Policy applications; b) provided guidance in the application of the ESD Policies through the identification of supporting VPP's, Planning and Advisory Practice notes and Reference documents; and c) reviewed permit conditions currently being used by councils. The review found that the consistent approach presented by local government along with the local ESD policies were having a positive cultural shift on ESD issues at VCAT, and enabling state's high level ESD objectives to be realised.

This policy work is supported by the ESD Officers at CASBE member councils, who continue to share their expertise, providing practical ESD advice and feedback to the development industry. At one member council the ESD Officer gave feedback on over 240 applications over the past 12 months.





We are proud of our role in enabling professional development and capacity building, both for local government and our stakeholders. Our efforts this year have included:

Training 58 people in the BESS tool / Daylight modelling and JV3 training for ESD Officers / BESS Training for Planners / Sustainable Design Training for Planners.

BESS V1.6 Upgrade

Representing significant change to user experience, the BESS V1.6 upgrade has recently gone live. V1.6 brings BESS up to WCAG 2.1 Level AA accessibility level and introduces improved usability through the introduction of modal tables. It is also now easier to publish projects and make ongoing changes to existing projects.

The water section has been reviewed and revised, including more comprehensive potable water calculations and scoring, and up-to-date WELS ratings. Recycled and third pipe water systems are now integrated into the calculations.

Non-residential spaces have a different input approach allowing more flexibility and finer grain detail.

Houses now have a cross ventilation credit in Indoor Environment Quality, and a new approach to the calculation of solar PV's.

In the back end, council officers now have the ability to tag projects in accordance with their permit status.
